Hospitality has been on my mind these past few weeks...maybe it's the Mary and Martha story, the Good Samaritan story, or when Jesus sent out the 70. Hospitality has a place in the Bible and in our lives. I think about how hospitality has reemerged in our lives this year...we've resumed hosting people in our homes again. We've re-gathered around a cup of coffee to share a story or to catch up.

The world has felt less hospitaliable lately, whether it's related to COVID, political strife, or some other glaring difference. We have been wary of each other. We've wondered, will someone get me sick, will they be intolerant of my beliefs, is it safe to be myself, or do I need to keep my guard up?

Trust might not be the first thing you think of when you think about hospitality, but it does play a part. If you don't feel a person is trustworthy, you won't be able to fully share yourself. Some acts of hospitality are automatic... you hold a door open, or you say thank you to the waiter who removes your dirty dishes. These acts don't require a sense of trust, but there are deeper acts of hospitality that depend on trust. When your car has broken down and a stranger

I'd rather be on the side of offering it than receiving it... It seems safer and easier to control. That's probably where there's a lesson to be learned, in the unsafe and uncontrollable situations.

Shelly Francis, in *The Courage Way,* writes that there are touchstones that help create trust. They help us move towards trusting, belonging, and understanding. These are things that every human being craves, and I think they tie beautifully into the community Jesus

calls us to participate in.

Give and Receive Welcome: We do this every Sunday. We notice the visitor, them in conversation, answer questions, and invite them to coffee.

Be Present as Fully as Possible:

This one's a little harder. It asks us to bring all of ourselves to the table...even our reservations and fears. It goes beyond a superficial welcome, beyond the way we present ourselves to the outside world, and exposes our joys and sufferings.

Extend Invitation, Not Demand: Some of the best invitations I've ever received are the ones that are open-ended. The invite is there, but there's not a feeling of pressure to participate one way or another. What a gift it is to go at your own pace!

Speak Your Truth in Ways that Respect Other

People's Truth: Sharing our stories involves revealing
where we land on issues. While that's neither bad nor
good, it can be contentious. Because of this, (continued)

offers to help you, do you accept their assistance?

In some ways, we've lost the ability to trust others' hospitality. Maybe it's because we've been wounded in the past, we're dependent on the ideal of independence, or maybe it's foolish or unsafe to receive it. Being in a spot to receive care means we're vulnerable.

sometimes we hold our beliefs close and are less likely to share them...withholding a part of who we are. But we can But we can express ourselves and our deepest opinions without feeling vulnerable to an attack. We can share our beliefs as a statement, not as something up for debate, but something that gives the listener insight into who we are and what's important to us. We can do it without disparaging each other.

No Fixing or Saving: We aren't the ones who are responsible for saving each other. Jesus does that work. We don't have to right every wrong. We can care for others as they are, even if we feel they are misguided. This kind of hospitality respects the capacity of another to come to their own conclusions as they begin to discover new revelations.

Wonder: Inevitably, we might start to find ourselves feeling defensive when faced with someone who stands in opposition to our beliefs. If those feelings surface, wonder is a good companion. Wonder about your reaction...is there something to be learned here? Wonder what's appealing to the other person in order to adopt this belief. Wonder has a way of inviting empathy.

Asking Open, Honest Questions: Participate as a listener. Listening is a form of hospitality. Asking questions can help a person audibly process how they feel and name things they didn't realize were there before. It can open the door for new insights.

Trust the Silence: Silence can feel awkward and we quickly try to fill those spaces. Practice letting the silence linger a little longer. Silence gives us time to think and process.

Seeds Planted Here Keep Growing: We live in between reality and what it can be. Where we encounter people isn't necessarily where stories end. We're all on a journey. We travel together for different lengths of time. We might have a one-time encounter, or a companion for years. Each of those experiences can leave an imprint on us and contributes to mutual transformations and understandings along the way.

These are things to ponder as we contemplate hospitality in our church, our homes, and in our community.

Living Our Baptisms



Recently while browsing the ELCA.org website, I came across a brief, but powerful article entitled *Faith Practices – Living Our Baptism*. I'd like to share just an excerpt with you:

We are living in unprecedented times—a health pandemic with economic uncertainty and unresolved racism. There is much that we cannot control, but we can control our choices of behavior. Now is the time to intentionally choose healthy patterns to offset the grief and lament related to these times as we shift to a new normal.

Healthy choices include faith practices. The Affirmation of Baptism (see box on right) provides five faith practices to integrate into our daily life. Receive each as a gift from God.

Affirmation of Baptism

and deed;

Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

live among God's faithful people;

hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper; proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word

serve all people following the example of Jesus; and
strive for justice and peace in all the earth?"

Response: We do, and ask God to help and guide us. (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pg. 236)

Mortgage Buy Down Goal Reached



The "Mortgage Buy Down" fundraiser, which is ending soon, has received \$18,115 as of July 15th, exceeding the \$18,000 goal. These funds will be used to reduce the outstanding principal on our \$184,000 adjustable-rate mortgage. The current rate of 3.875%, which is locked in until May of 2027. Based on our current monthly payment, this mortgage will not be paid off until September of 2032, and we can expect two more interest rate adjustments during that time.

Our "Buy Down" fundraiser offers a unique opportunity to participate in the prepayment of part of the principal we owe. Every dollar raised will help eliminate months, if not years, of monthly payments, saving the congregation thousands of dollars in interest. And we will eliminate at least one upcoming interest rate adjustment.

There are only a few weeks to participate in this extraordinary "Buy Down" event. Donations may be made by cash or check or you may participate by making an online donation. Simply visit the church website "CTKWBL.ORG", click on the "GIVE" tile, and follow the instructions on the drop-down menu. Many thanks to all of you who have ensured the success of this campaign through your generous donations.

The mortgage balance as of June 30 = \$184,605.



A Message from the COVID Team.

This is a friendly reminder that COVID-19 is still with us. The COVID risk level determined by the CDC remains low for our surrounding counties, however, new COVID cases have ben increasing recently. Even as worship precautions at CTK have eased, we offer you and those you care about to stay well.

Stay up to date with vaccines and boosters.

CALL COMMITTEE

The call committee is working diligently under the supervision of the synod to find Christ the King a new pastor. The call process is quite extensive. It requires in-depth planning and research in preparation for the next several years at CTK. The call committee is focusing on who we are as a church, what are our needs as a congregation, and how we want the CTK ministry to evolve as we look to the future.

The call process is broken into four phases per the synod. Christ the King is currently in phase 2. Here is a brief overview of the four phases.

Phase 1 - 1-3 Months

- o Pastor announces leave.
- o Council meets with synod to secure an interim and begin the call process.
- o Congregation says farewell to the pastor.

Phase 2 - 3-12 Months

- o Interim Pastor begins.
- o Council begins preparatory work.
- Mission Exploration Team (included with the Call Committee in smaller congregations) is created and begins gathering information/research for the Ministry Site Profile (MSP).
- The MSP provides descriptions of the congregation's current life and dynamics, future mission challenges and goals, qualities sought in a new pastor.
- o Congregation participates as invited in the development of MSP.
- MSP is presented to the congregation. The MSP is the main document used by the synod to recruit

- the main document used by the synod to recruit pastoral candidates for specific congregations.
- The Call Committee creates a job description based on MSP.

Phase 3 - 2-4 Months

- o MSP is completed.
- o Council works closely with the Call Committee to finalize details.
- The Call Committee works to identify and recommend a new pastor by conducting interviews, checking references, and recommending a candidate.
- Congregation meets to vote on Call Committee recommendation

Phase 4 - 6-9 Months

- o Call issued
- Council and Congregation welcome new Pastor and say farewell to interim.

This is a very high level outline of the call process. We will share more detailed information as we dive deeper into the Call Process Manual. The call committee is dedicated and committed to their work in following the call process as guided by the synod. I am proud of the work we have done so far and look forward to the coming months of work we have ahead. Thanks for your on-going support and prayers as we navigate this process.
