

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Summer is truly upon us now. The days are longer, heating up, and moving as fast as summer always passes in Minnesota! Perhaps you are also enjoying summer with outdoor activities, vacations, trips up north, or enjoying a cool beverage on your patio or deck.

This summer I want to invite you to consider a few ways to engage with Christ the King. The first is to come to a Wednesday night for "Good Stewards Together." You are invited to join us for dinner any time between 5:30 and 6:30 pm with activities to begin at 6:30 pm. This summer we are focusing on how we are good stewards – and that stewardship is so much more than money. There are four sessions left in July and August – and I know I would love to see you there!

You are also invited to participate in an intentional congregational listening project. The CTK Council has decided that we will be exploring our stated mission and values to see if they still reflect where God is leading us. The last four years have been a lot: a pandemic that changed how we did church overnight, the transition back to in-person worship, and a pastoral transition. Not to mention all of the highs and lows of life that the body of Christ experienced individually over that same period of time. I trust that God is leading us still and God is with us through all of the highs and lows that we experience. In order to perceived where God is leading us, we need to start by listening. Who do we listen to? One another! It is in our collective responses to three questions that we'll be able to see how God is leading us and discern what CTK's mission and values are in this present time.

And you can be a part of the process. There are two ways that you are invited into participating. The first way is to attend a training to be listener during one of these one-to-one conversations. I'll be leading two options for training – after worship on Sunday, July 14 and at 7 pm on Wednesday, July 17. Both will be in the Conference Room. You'll leave equipped to do some deep intentional listening of fellow congregation members as we work together to listen to where God is leading us now.

We also need people to say an enthusiastic yes when a listener contacts them to set up a one-toone conversation. These conversations are not meant to be a sales pitch, an ask for anything, or a time for chit-chatting, but an opportunity to learn about you, your hopes for the church, and help provide valuable information for the CTK church council to sift through in discerning how God is leading us now. Our plans is to begin the one-toone conversations in mid-July and conduct a many as possible by September 8 so that the Council may be able to present their findings at the annual meeting.

Our mission begins with listening – and you are a critical part of that mission! Don't miss out on an opportunity to both participate in sharing about yourself and your hopes and to do the intentional listening to another CTK member.

DEVOTION

Pray Without Ceasing

Recently, I came across a treasured Living Lutheran magazine that I kept from March of 2019. In it was an article entitled, Pray without ceasing: A Lutheran approach to prayer. As I was re-reading the article, it got me reflecting on my own thoughts and experiences regarding prayer. As I grow deeper in my faith, I find that prayer is an integral part of a life of faith.

Indeed, Paul encourages us to "pray without ceasing," in 1 Thessalonians 5:17, just as Martin Luther's writings suggest someone in continual conversation with God, as noted by the above article. We also know Jesus prayed frequently, especially at times of great importance or in response to demanding challenges, as we so often hear in scripture.

As I prepare myself for seminary, my spiritual director encouraged me to "pray first, Michael, and often." He also encouraged me to unclutter my life, to be open to prayer as a natural state, to serve where I can right now, and to devote myself to my theological studies, as a hopeful leader in the church, with a goal for the future.

I am often reminded that we're invited to prayerful connections with God in such unique, holy ways – the circumstances and surroundings are endless. That's the beauty of prayer – the soil for it, the Where do you feel yourself most calm? I'll bet prayer is involved, persistently invited by our loving God.

Through our baptisms, we are marked for Christ and hardwired for a communion with God. That communion especially comes to us is prayer, both in private and in assembly. But that communion must be cultivated, like a thriving crop – like that tiny, but glorious mustard seed from Mark's gospel.

I find the quiet part of our home or office, or the stillness of our church sanctuary outside of liturgical worship, or the natural surroundings of Creation to be the fertile soils of private prayer... and it involves dedicated time – time set aside for it, just like when we set aside our regular liturgies together and our weekly offerings – first, not necessarily as an afterthought. It also involves active listening, like we'll be doing more of this summer in a wholesomely structured way. A dear friend called this a form of contemplative prayer - being open to God's movement in our lives, making us better by reminding us of our hardwiring through baptism.

The Ancient Greek term metanoia denotes a change of mind, a reorientation, a fundamental transformation of outlook, of a person's vision of the world and of herself/himself, and a new way of loving others and God. Luther taught that we should pray constantly, as a way of life. May we never

CHURCH COUNCIL

Council Corner

Over the years, Christ the King has developed 28 policies and procedures. These policies provide guidance for our financial and business practices. Two of these policies, the Policy against Violence and the Policy Against Sexual Misconduct, were reviewed at the June meeting. Both of these policies require periodic education about the content of these policies.

The Policy against Violence states:

Christ the King Lutheran Church will not tolerate conduct, by actions or words, reasonably perceived as threatening or intimidating against its employees, congregation members or visitors. Christ the King Lutheran Church is committed to providing a safe place for all individuals and we will continue to address the issues of violence in sermons, in our Sunday school, our youth groups, nursery, the church council, and ministry teams.

The Policy against Sexual Misconduct states:

It is the policy of Christ the King Lutheran Church that sexual misconduct will not be tolerated. Any complaint of sexual misconduct will be dealt with quickly and confidentially. This policy applies to pastors, lay employees, volunteers and congregation members. The intent of this policy is to make certain that responses to any allegation of sexual misconduct be appropriate and compassionate for all involved, and that all parties be heard. In accordance with federal and state laws and legal definitions, all staff and volunteers are mandated to report suspected sexual abuse of children and vulnerable adults to the proper authorities. We will comply with any and all legal mandates. Furthermore, Christ the King Lutheran Church bears affirmative responsibility to create an environment of hospitality for all people which is free of these sins and encourages respect, equality and kinship in Christ.
