

PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Happy New Year! It isn't quite 2025, but we are entering into a new church year with the beginning of Advent. We will be preparing for Jesus to come into the world again, as we enter into the church season of Advent, a time of anticipation and waiting. It is always a curious church season, as we know that Jesus was born in the world – and yet we await his coming again by retelling the story of his birth.

This Advent season our theme will be "Words for the Beginning." It's a season of endings and beginnings. As a new calendar year arrives on the horizon, the new church year begins. Christ's birth moves us into a new way of living and loving and yet the world keeps on going forward. This Advent season will ground us through a series of blessings. These blessings are the imagined words that Mary would speak to her newborn baby son. Each weekly theme might seem like a lesson for children, yet these are lessons that we continue to learn and relearn as adults.

"Words for the Beginning" will start on Sunday, December 1 and continue through Epiphany, which we will celebrate on January 5. Each week we will hear scripture that we might have heard at a wedding or baptism. Just as these are new chapters in the lives of believers, each Sunday will help us enter into a new beginning and we will be given reminders to hold onto for the road ahead.

This Advent season we will also utilize some



familiar imagery: quilting. The hope is that the themes in this series will feel like a blanket wrapped around you, providing warmth and comfort as you begin again. The main logo for our Advent series is inspired by a design called a 'kaleidoscope' quilt. It's formed by basic shapes:

triangles, squares, and circles. The simple shapes are similar to the weekly reminders in this series— they are basic lessons we teach to children but remain building blocks of our lives as

adults. You might notice a familiar image in the center of the logo - an Advent wreath!

Each week we will get an opportunity to create a new quilt block that symbolizes the theme for each Sunday. Thanks to Elida Olson for creating paper quilt packets for each Sunday through Epiphany. We will get a chance to exercise our creativity and make a paper quilt square to remind us of each Sunday's theme. All you'll need to bring is yourself and a willingness to put together squares of paper with glue to create the theme quilt block. Join us in the Fellowship Hall during coffee hour – you can bring your quilt squares home or add them to the display at church.

This Advent season will be an opportunity for us to be reminded of timeless lessons as we encounter familiar Bible stories and await the birth of Jesus at Christmas. May we all be blessed as we come together in community to begin again.

DEVOTION

As I approach my tenth year at Christ the King and my first year of seminary, I am reminded that it is a special time in the church year, thanks in no small measure to each of you. I am also reminded of the Advent Sunday when the gospel is Mark 13:24-37. It's not a "warm and fuzzy" passage. As Bishop Michael Rinehart points out, "Chapter 13 is the Gospel of Mark's little apocalypse," adding that "Mark 13 looks to the end of the world and the messianic return, which Mark says will happen a short time after this destruction (of the temple)." Bishop Mike explains:

"Advent was not originally the time of preparation for celebrating Christ's birthday. In fact, the startling thing in reading the Church Fathers' Advent sermons is that there is little to no mention of Christmas in them. These early Advent sermons are about being ready for the second coming.

Whether preparing for Christmas or preparing for the second coming, the theme of "preparation" is clear. We might reflect on how we prepare to meet Christ, whether at the end of the world or the end of your life. Let's all draft our obituaries. Ponder what you might like the speaker to say at your funeral. How you live now, the choices you are making right this minute, will shape that eulogy. I once watched a show in which Stephen Hawking assured us that the sun wasn't scheduled to do the things Mark describes for a few more million years. I then attended a funeral of someone who died too young. I was reminded that, regardless of the timing of the end of the world, we are, everyone one of us, only a short time from meeting our Maker. Maybe today. You don't know what hour, like a thief in the night. Are you ready?"

When I re-read Mark 13, I was a bit taken aback by its somewhat dark tone, but after I reflected on Bishop Mike's commentary, a message began to sink in: Advent is about faithful, hopeful, and actually, joyful expectation. Advent is demonstrative of the expectation and preparations we're invited to make in our daily lives—for Christ, in response to the opportunity presented to us, in living graciously and generously as servant-disciples. Imagine approaching each of our days as if they were our last—before meeting our Maker—what an aspiration!

UPDATES

CHURCH COUNCIL

Council Corner

Council initiatives update:

1. One-to-one conversations – We are assembling the information from the conversations to help us assess our vision and mission. This effort will probably be finished in 2025.

2. Sound System – The council received a quote from Excel AV Group for the components and labor to improve both the on-line and inperson sound. The council is getting clarification on one of the items and will assess the final cost in December. The council is also looking into hiring a sound engineering company to help with balancing both the on line and in-person sound levels. It is expected that the council will bring a proposal for congregation approval at the annual meeting in January.

3. Window Repair – The property team found a company to repair the rot in the rear sanctuary windows. The council approved and signed the contract. The repairs will be funded with existing designated funds earmarked for window repair. The sanctuary windows should be repaired in December.

Finally, a big thank you to those who have turned in an estimate of giving card. To date, we've received 32 estimates of giving cards with an average pledge increase of approximately 5%. Last year we received 49 cards. If have yet to turn in a card, please consider turning one in. Estimates of giving are very important in our budget planning for the year. ADMIN & FINANCE
